

# **Master of Legal Professions**

Master of Law, Economy, Management Justice, trials and procedures honours Legal professions studies

This Master course is for students intending to work in the legal sector (lawyers, magistrates, clerks, notaries, ushers), police, gendarmerie and prison administration or students wanting an in-depth insight into this essential part of the legal world.

Course highlights:

- > Interactive teaching
- > Students build their own professional career path based on their objectives
- > Work placement agreements with Saint-Étienne High Court and Court Lawyers
- > An accounting agreement with the Saint-Étienne IEJ (Institute of Legal Studies)

### **Objectives**

Train future professionals in legal procedures and techniques required for the role by building on an approach incorporating substantive law and procedure.

> Vocational training: compulsory placement, practical lessons, involvement of legal professionals, attendance of practitioner seminars etc.

> Introduction to research: thesis drafting, involvement in group research, attendance of research seminars and/or CERCRID conferences (research centre) etc.

> Development of critical thought through teaching and methodology focused on lines of thought in law, reasoning, legal evolutions, history etc.

> **Preparation for tests and exams** to work in different legal professions or in universities through the teaching of technical and methodological skills.

### **Prospects**

The Master of Legal Professions is suitable for two types of projects:



#### Preparation for tests and exams to work in the legal sector

The Master of Legal Professions and preparation provided by the Saint-Étienne IEJ are designed as complementary courses (if the student so wishes). The subjects taught are secant in the two structures but with very different approaches: IEJ provides an update and training in certain exercises (case study, executive summary); the Master provides advanced substantive and procedural learning. Students can also tailor-make the joint degree by choosing the number of modules they wish to take at IEJ alongside their Master's year.

#### PhD thesis preparation to go into a university career or become a CNRS researcher

The Master of Legal Professions is linked to the CEntre de Recherches CRItiques sur le Droit (CERCRID UMR-CNRS 5137). Students can take part in some of the legal research centre's events and in group research. The centre's expertise in legal analysis is what brought about **a "Justice-University" partnership** 

with Saint-Étienne High Court which 2nd year Master's students are directly involved in. This type of partnership is doubly useful: it's useful for magistrates who can benefit from in-depth research work and it's useful for students who devote their thesis to a subject that has particular merit in the legal practice and use difficulties arising from this practice as their start point.

# **Teaching method**

The Legal Professions course takes 2 years (4 semesters). First year:

- > Complete the degree's general legal training with certain subjects that tend to be for advanced students such as international private law.
- > Advanced study of the most important technical subjects in the legal profession e.g. criminal law, civil law, criminal procedure and civil procedure.
- > **Provide options** enabling students to start focusing seriously on a criminal or civil law specialisation at this stage in their training.

Second year:

- > Advanced study of certain fundamental subjects.
- > Prepare students for the practice of reasoning required to succeed in professional exams and to work in the aforementioned professions.
- > Pursue the specialisation in criminal or civil law.
